User Choice: The User Choice program provides a public funding contribution towards the cost of training and assessment services for eligible Queensland apprentices and trainees.

[Wage, hours and costs](#): Learn more about your wages, hours and costs of employment including type of employment, fees, material expenses, allowances and leave entitlements.

[Subsidised training and incentives](#) Funding to cover the full cost of training with a training provider when you choose a high priority apprenticeship or traineeship. Just choose the qualification you want, land an apprenticeship or traineeship with an employer and they will cover the cost of your training. Your employer will pay your wages but you might have to meet costs related to any uniform or other training resources.

Disabled Australian Apprentice Wage Support Program

Disabled Australian Apprentice Wage Support Program is a payment that assists employers of eligible Australian Apprentices with disabilities. Employment Assistance Fund

Help is available through the [Employment Assistance Fund \(EAF\)](#) which gives financial aid to eligible people so they can buy work related modifications, equipment, help and services. It is good to tell prospective employers that they can access the EAF through Disability Employment Services or jobactive organisations.

Tertiary study applicants with a disability

If you have a disability, tertiary institutions have services and facilities available such as:

- access to specialised technology and equipment
- sign language interpreters
- note-taking services.

QTAC application number for scholarship applications

You may need your QTAC application number when applying for scholarships. This number was on the last screen of your QTAC application after you have paid the application fee. It is also in your application confirmation email and in your online QTAC Account information section of your application.

If you place a creative arts course as the first preference on your QTAC application you will be automatically considered for a scholarship valued at \$20,000. This will assist you financially throughout your studies and provide extra development opportunities that build leadership skills and professional networks. All you need to do is complete a simple application form that includes your current school name and the course you wish to study. Did you use the 'desired – back-up - pathway' plan when organising your preferences?

Go to the [QTAC website](#) and P10 in your QTAC Guide for information about managing your preferences. It is important to plan your preferences well. When preferencing your courses you should have:

Preferences 1 & 2 - Your most desired courses leading to your desired career direction

Preferences 3 & 4 - Your supporting courses that will see you moving towards your desired career direction

Preferences 5 & 6 - Your courses that will see you start tertiary study and when successful, improve your tertiary rank for competing for a future course.

Your sixth preference should be one that you have a very good chance of gaining entry to, given its previous adjusted ATAR/rank threshold and your results. You also need to check the offer round dates of your preferences and make changes if the dates differ (preferences need to be chronologically organised according to the offer round of the courses you are applying for).

Courses you are offered in early offer rounds can be conditionally accepted and you can change your preferences for subsequent offer rounds if necessary.

Don't include wasted courses/preferences. Wasted courses include those that:

- You do not meet the entry requirements
- You would not do if you got an offer for them
- Are located in regional centres that you have not consulted your parents/guardians about
- Are too difficult or impossible to commute to given where you live
- Are very competitive and you listed them below much less competitive courses.

Eligibility requirements for Nursing/Midwifery courses

There are additional eligibility requirements for all applicants applying for courses relating to nursing and midwifery. When applying for these courses, you may have a competitive ATAR/selection rank and satisfy subject prerequisites, however you will not be considered for an offer if you do not comply with additional eligibility requirements relevant to your course. When you are applying for your chosen course, it's vital to submit your application by the specified deadlines. This [page](#) has all the closing dates so you are fully prepared and ready for your tertiary study journey. Courses related to creative and performing arts may have additional requirements that need to be satisfied, including:

- portfolio
- questionnaire.

What happens if I defer my QTAC offer?

Deferment lets you delay starting your course start date. Usually, you can defer for up to a year, but some institutions let you defer for longer while others do not allow deferment. In most cases, you can defer when you respond to your QTAC offer and the institution will contact you to advise what to do next. See page 16 in your QTAC book or click [here](#) to find each institution's deferment policy.



External assessment info

If you are studying QCAA General subjects, you will sit external assessments at the end of Year 12 as part of your assessment for each subject. External assessments are subject-based written exams that are:

- common to all schools
- summative — they count towards your final subject result for QCAA General subjects
- developed and marked by the QCAA.

3 Myths About Early Entry Programs

year13 knows that you've heard about Early Entry programs but there's a lot of muddled info out there. So, they thought they'd break down some of the biggest myths surrounding how you can take the stress out of your studies and lock in a place at a great uni! Just a heads up, they're using the University of New England (UNE) as an example in the article and not all universities have the same early entry policies, so make sure you check up on all the different policies of any unis you're applying to. Myth 1: If I'm planning on using an early entry scheme, I don't have to worry about my marks in Year 11 or Year 12

Myth 2: Getting an Early Entry offer means I can't apply for other courses later

Myth 3: You can apply for any course you want via the Early Entry Program

Early offers

Offers made through Universities' Early Offer schemes for Year 12 are mostly being made by QTAC, however, some are made directly from the institution. Your options are:

- accepting the offer outright
- accepting the offer conditionally
- deferring (depending on the university).

Check with the university directly or contact QTAC.

If you accept an early offer outright, your QTAC application will stop there. If a university does allow you to conditionally accept an early offer and you choose this option because you are wanting a different course, you need to go back into your QTAC application and reorder your course preferences. Fast track options - are they suitable for you?

Most institutions use a semester system with two periods of study: the first from around March to June, followed by a short winter break and the second from around July to November, followed by a long summer

break. Some institutions and courses have a third period of study that takes place during the traditional summer break. These three periods are called trimesters. By fitting an extra semester's worth of material into each year, students can graduate from their course sooner (for example, a standard three-year bachelor degree may be completed in two years). These accelerated options are known as "fast-tracked" courses. The Good Universities Guide has put together an [article](#) that sets out the positives and negatives of the fast-track option so you can decide if it's for you.

[Course Seeker](#) is an Australian Government initiative where you can search and compare thousands of courses from different institutions across Australia. The website displays course information, entry requirements, admission processes, student satisfaction and graduate survey results. It is particularly helpful if you are thinking of studying interstate.

Open Universities Australia

If you can't get to a Uni campus (perhaps interstate or you are regional) or only want to study one subject/course to start with, then Open Universities Australia may be your answer. Open Universities Australia (OUA) offers online higher education courses through OUA, you can:

- Study online, so you have flexibility about when and where you study
- Choose from a large range of undergraduate courses
- Select individual undergraduate units/courses/subjects instead of a whole course
- Study with Australian universities e.g. Monash, Griffith, Macquarie, Curtin, RMIT, Swinburne University of Technology, University of South Australia and many more
- Graduate with the same qualification as an on-campus student
- Access online support services.

Eligible OUA students may be able to access HECS-HELP, FEE-HELP or VET Student Loans depending on their course. Find out more on the OUA [website](#).

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) reminder

If you have been negatively impacted by circumstances beyond your control, EAS may assist you in reaching your study dreams with rank adjustments. You might think of the obvious factors impacting you like financial hardship, illness or disabilities, however, EAS may also help in times of natural disasters. Some adjustments are applied automatically based on information in your QTAC application (e.g. school name for Priority School Adjustment Scheme).
