Australian Apprenticeships offer a world of opportunities

There are more than 500 occupations across Australia that offer <u>apprenticeships</u>. Most sectors of business and industry offer apprenticeships at various certificate levels from traditional trade to emerging occupations. With an Australian Apprenticeship, you can earn a wage while completing a nationally recognised qualification. It's a great way to get a head start in your chosen occupation. Australian Apprenticeships are based on competency. You can finish your apprenticeship early if you reach the required skill level. You can also qualify for more advanced training after completing an apprenticeship. What is a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship?

School-based apprentices and trainees, usually in Years 10, 11 and 12, are trained in their chosen apprenticeship or traineeship, in the workplace and through a training organization, while continuing to study towards their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) at school. To commence a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SAT), a student must have the support of the employer, the school, a supervising registered training organisation and their parent/guardian. The Department of Employment, Small Business and Training have put together a fact sheet which tells you about:

Does a course with a high ATAR guarantee better job prospects?

The Good Universities Guide has found that students tend to choose courses with the highest ATAR entry requirement they can. They believe that the higher the ATAR, the better the course and the better the employment outcome. If you're a high-achieving student, you may be considering a course that has a high ATAR minimum threshold score. It's important to note that the ATAR minimum threshold for courses is an indication of the popularity of a course, it doesn't necessarily reflect how good your options will be once you graduate. When looking at graduate outcomes, such as employment rate or a high starting salary, the courses with high ATAR requirements don't necessarily deliver the best outcomes — well, not straight away. ABS Labour Force Data - June 2025

The Australian Bureau of Statistics have released the Labour Force Data for June 2025:

- unemployment rate increased to 4.2%.
- participation rate remained at 67.0%.
- employment increased to 14,637,800.
- employment to population ratio remained at 64.2%.
- underemployment rate remained at 5.9%.
- monthly hours worked increased to 1,976 million.

Do you have what employers are looking for?

<u>JobJumpstart reports</u> that the Australian Government surveyed more than 3000 Australian employers to find out what advice they would give to young people looking for a job. Employers said they look for:

- a positive attitude
- motivation and enthusiasm

They also said that applicants need to:

- be respectful to colleagues and customers
- show a commitment to staying in the job for an acceptable period of time.

Employers also mentioned that some young people have unrealistic expectations of work, including:

What do Audiologists do?

Audiologists diagnose and provide rehabilitative support for people with hearing problems. They:

- Administer and interpret a wide range of audiometric (hearing) tests to determine hearing efficiency and identify hearing problems

- Evaluate total response patterns and acoustic tests to distinguish between organic and non-organic hearing loss

Tertiary Access payment

The Tertiary Access payment (TAP) helps students with the cost of moving from regional or remote areas for tertiary study. It is a one off payment of up to \$5,000 that helps eligible students with the cost of moving to study. This is for study after you've finished Year 12 or equivalent. To get the payment you need to meet some rules. Two main eligibility rules include:

- moving from a regional or remote area for tertiary study
- starting tertiary study in the year after finishing year 12 or equivalent.

Regional areas are places that aren't in or near a major city. Check if your <u>family home</u> is in a regional or remote area using the Student Regional Area Search. Click <u>here</u> for more information.

QUT Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander admissions pathway

The Centralised Assessment and Selection Program (CASP) is a culturally responsive admissions pathway for First Nations Peoples to enter most undergraduate courses. You can be considered for the program as part of your QTAC application which opens 5 August. Check their <u>website</u> to find out more.

Queensland Police First Nations Recruit Preparation Pathway (FNRPP)

The Queensland Police Service (QPS) offers positions for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in its First Nations Recruit Preparation Pathway (FNRPP). For successful participants, the FNRPP provides direct entry into the recruit training program. Participants for the FNRPP are selected by QPS Recruiting during the recruiting process in consultation with the applicant. Potential applicants also may be referred to the program via our First Nations Recruitment Team. Individuals who wish to be considered for entry to the FNRPP can do so by completing the standard requirements.

To be eligible for appointment to the QPS as an IRPP participant, you must successfully satisfy the requirements of all three stages of the IRPP selection process:

Stage 1 - minimum application requirements

Stage 2 - applicant assessments

Stage 3 - selection

How are applicants selected for courses through QTAC?

Many courses you apply for through QTAC for study in 2026 are competitive. Consequently, many institutions use specific selection criteria when selecting successful applicants. Once institution admission rules are met (i.e. English Language Proficiency – automatic for most domestic students; age requirements – generally 18 years or completion of Year 12) selection is based on:

- meeting minimum entry requirements for the course (this may include subject prerequisites (usually General subjects), a portfolio; an interview or audition; a specific test, an essay or questionnaire; the successful completion of a course etc), and
- merit (ATAR or a QTAC Selection Rank).

Through the QTAC process, eligible applicants (i.e. those who meet the entry requirements) are considered in order of merit (i.e. ATAR or QTAC Selection Rank). The ATAR or Rank of the last person to get into the course before all places are filled becomes the lowest ATAR/Selection Rank to receive an offer (called minimum selection threshold), for that course, in that offer round. In the 2026 QTAC Guide, website and university websites, it is referred to as the LSR (Lowest Selection Rank) offered Semester 1, 2025 (you should refer to adjusted LSR). The courses' minimum thresholds can move up or down each year due to annual demand and the previous year's minimum thresholds are used as a guide only.

Opening of QTAC Admission 2026

Year 12 students can start their 2026 <u>QTAC Application</u> from 5 August by registering for their ATAR in the ATAR Portal and QTAC Applications through the QTAC Application Portal. **You MUST register** using your personal email address, **not** a school one!

Some important points:

- A QTAC application costs \$70 before 30 September 2025 and \$150 on or after 1 October 2025.
- You need to pay for your application before it is accepted.
- The only payment methods are MasterCard or VISA, BECS direct debit and EFTPOS (debit card).
- If paying with a Debit card, you will need to pay by 25 September so that the money can arrive in the QTAC bank account before 30 September.
- If you are having difficulty paying for your QTAC application or you can only pay with cash, you should see your guidance officer/counsellor to make other arrangements.
- Be sure to print your payment receipt so you have evidence of payment and to be sure you have successfully lodged your application.

The difference between QCE and ATAR

QTAC states that the Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and the ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) are different and have different purposes:

- QCE certifies learning, ie shows a student's academic achievement and at what standard they
 achieved in each subject during their senior schooling. The QCE may be considered by employers
 and the general community.
- ATAR indicates a student's position (or ranking) compared to all other students in the state. The only intended purpose for the ATAR is to assist with selecting applicants for tertiary study.

My QCE Student Portal registration

If you are in Year 12 the <u>myQCE Student Portal</u> is where you will find all your learning information, subjects studied, results, VET certificates etc. You can check your personal details, access your learning account, get your final Year 12 results and more. You will need to <u>register</u> before you leave school and it's best to do it sooner than be rushed at the end of the year. You will need your full name as recorded in your school enrolment (no nick names or shortened names) and your LUI number which you can get from your school.

Tax File Number and Unique Student Identifier reminder

Supporting your child with their university application through the Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC) can make a significant difference.
